## Funding Workshops

Your community partnership officer is arranging a funding workshop for you in September or October. The workshop will give you information about a range of funds available to you, including: the 2013/14 Local Grant, Promoting Independence for the over-65s, Positive Activities for young people, the Open4Funding system, and external grants from Big Lottery and others.

The sessions will give you an opportunity to explore project ideas, network with others with similar ideas, discuss possible partnership work, and maximise the funding potential from each strand. It will also discuss how funding can be used to match-fund with other sources of funding.

## Conserve a verge, and rescue wildflowers

The Conservation Volunteers organisation is looking for 50 locations around East Yorkshire where, with the help of their volunteer group and local community participation, verge or species-rich habitat can be conserved.

They are asking for your help to identify and get involved in the active management of 50 metres of verge, that is either already rich in wildflower species or needs managing to conserve or restore its natural beauty. If these verges are unmanaged for too long, many of the wildflower species and associated wildlife will disappear.

Conservation work generally takes place following the flowering and seeding of wildflowers in late September. ## Recycling news

Our residents recycled 60 per cent of their waste in June, following the roll-out of fortnightly collections of blue bins to three-quarters of all households. The recycling rate for April, May and June has consistently been around 60 per cent with waste in the green landfill bins going down every month this year.

In June, there was a huge jump in the amount of garden waste in the brown bins for composting - it almost doubled to 5,000 tonnes. This followed the cold spring, which delayed residents getting into their gardens.

Figures for June are:

- 2,097 tonnes of waste, including glass, paper and plastics, were collected from blue recycling bins compared with 1,871 in June 2012
- 5,004 tonnes of garden and food waste was sent for composting from the brown bins
- 4,633 tonnes of waste from green bins were sent to landfill, compared with 5,228 tonnes in June 2012.





## Sewing mailbags?

Few parishes play host to a prison, but Full Sutton and Skirpenbeck does – HMP Full Sutton was built in 1987 as a maximum-security unit for prisoners from around the country. Recently, prison managers have been working in partnership with the parish council to give something back to the community.

Until recently, the parish council did not have a community venue to use for their meetings, and had to travel to a nearby parish. HMP Full Sutton now makes its training unit building, outside the prison, available for the meetings.

The parish council now holds coffee mornings for residents at the prison's visitor centre, with cakes and scones baked in the prison. The events have proved very popular, and the community partnership is discussing how the events might be expanded to help reduce social isolation for the over-65s.

The local children's group is working with the prison to lease some land so they can create a children's play area. The prison's management team has generously offered to pay for half the associated legal fees.

Full Sutton village has very limited access to local facilities, especially a shop. Through the new partnership, a social enterprise scheme is building a new shop for both residents and visitors to the prison, which local residents will run.

Prisoners work an average of 24 hours each week – but things have moved on from sewing mailbags. Their work now includes: picking and packing goods for DHL; making textiles; a Braille workshop; and ICT work. Recently, prisoners at Full Sutton made replacement official robes for the Pocklington Town Crier.

The prison has capacity to expand into printing, laundry, furniture production and waste recycling. It is keen to explore how its workshops can work with local organisations, keeping costs down and giving real work for prisoners while protecting jobs in the community from the risk of unfair competition.

## Bridlington Street Angels

The launch of this scheme took place at Emmanuel Church in Bridlington on Saturday, 15 June when the first 14 Angels graduated and were commissioned.

Street Angel volunteers give at least one evening a month to the Saturday night patrols, which help:

- young people who have become vulnerable
- homeless people who want to be sign-posted to other services
- people who have had too much to drink and need a helping hand
- visitors who need directions
- people in need of basic first aid
- by picking up glasses and glass bottles, making the streets safer.

## Dish the dog dirt

## Becks and Drains

The community-led River Hull Valley Drainage Heritage Group has created a Becks, Banks, Drains and Brains exhibition. It explores the history of the area and how it became one of England's best-drained marshlands.

It will be at Beverley Treasure House Beverley during August, before it sets off on a tour of village halls and other venues in the coming months.

## Events in Beverley

The town council has arranged events as part of its 'Field to Table' project:

Sunday, 6 October: Beverley Food Festival in Saturday Market from 10am to 3.30pm - a free event for all the family. This will be its eighth year, and include over 100 stalls offering locally-grown and produced food and drink. There will be a Food Theatre featuring cooking demonstrations from highly-acclaimed local chefs.

Saturday, 30 November: Christmas Festival of Food and Drink inside Beverley Minster, from 10am to 3.30pm. This free event will include almost 60 stalls selling local food and drink, cookery demonstrations and flower-arranging demonstrations, with a festive theme. Entertainment will feature medieval-styled musicians and seasonal singers.

## Awards for All

The Big Lottery Fund has awarded Elloughton cum Brough Town Council a grant of £8,700 to cover the cost of resurfacing the car park at the village hall on Elloughton Road, Brough.

The car park had become increasingly uneven and both town councillors and village hall trustees had become very concerned for the safety of people using it. It was clear that remedial work was required, and the council made a bid to Awards for All, England. The car park has been resurfaced by local family-run company Scientific Roads, who responded quickly and did a great job.

## Warm Winter Friends

It seems strange to be thinking about winter when the weather is so warm, but now is a good time to plan for the coming season. Welton Parish Council started its 'Warm Winter Friends' scheme three years ago, when they realised the extreme weather had created terrific neighbourliness of people in the parish.

Those fit and able came out with their shovels, helped get cars moving through the roads, cleared their own drives and those of near neighbours unable to do it themselves. The parish council was so impressed about the positive way people responded they asked residents to offer their willingness to be a Winter Friend.

The parish council then matched respondents with nearby neighbours, and exchanged each other's contact details. During bad weather, the Winter Friend then offered to do things like phone or call round to check the heating is working, shovel drives to make it safer to get to the footpath, and offer to get essential shopping when they are going themselves.
