Tackling dog fouling

In October, a Bridlington man was faced with paying over £700 after East Riding of Yorkshire Council took him to magistrates' court for failing to pay fixed penalty notices after his dogs had persistently fouled the street near his home.

By working in partnership with town and parish councils, East Riding of Yorkshire Council is enforcing the message that irresponsible dog owners who fail to clean up their mess could end up in court.

Twenty town and parish councils are now taking part in a scheme to tackle dog fouling. East Riding of Yorkshire Council is inviting the councils to training sessions on how to provide evidence for penalty notices and court cases. Five town and parish councils have been taking part in the scheme for the last few months: Stamford Bridge, Wilberfoss, Withernsea, Cottingham and Nafferton.

A recent training event was provided for representatives from a further 15 town and parish councils: Driffield, Hutton Cranswick, Skerne and Wansford, Barmby Moor, Pocklington, Millington, Newbald, North Cave, South Cave, Burstwick, Hedon, Preston, Gowdall, Pollington, and Snaith and Cowick.

Councillor Jackie Cracknell, portfolio holder for community involvement and performance, said: "This scheme is about making sure those few irresponsible owners, who have not yet got the message that they have to clean up the mess, come under greater pressure.

"Our aim is to improve the reporting of incidents of dog fouling and speed up the time it takes to deal with them. We hope that by involving town and parish councils, residents will feel more comfortable reporting to their local representative what they have seen or an owner who persistently offends."

Churchyard conservation

The Conservation Volunteer group in East Yorkshire has recently completed a wildflower meadow creation project in the churchyard of St. Magnus's Church, Bessingby. This involved removing the overgrown vegetation and turf from an area the size of a tennis court and sowing a wildflower and meadow grass seed.

Many rural churchyards are prime wildlife havens for a variety of plants and animals. The Conservation Volunteers (TCV) is a national environmental charity that works with volunteer groups in practical conservation work on Local Nature Reserves, woodlands and green spaces all over the East Riding of Yorkshire.

Paul Charlton, who coordinated the maintenance work at St. Magnus's Church said: "I am very pleased with TCV. They did a brilliant job, turned up on time and just got on with it. We are just waiting now to see the wildflowers next year."

Over the past five years, TCV volunteers have been involved in the management, conservation and creation of wildlife rich habitats. TCV would be very interested to hear from any parish that would like to improve or conserve a churchyard for the benefit of both wildlife and visitors. Fly tipping

As evenings draw in and fly tippers get more active under the cover of darkness, East Riding of Yorkshire Council is stepping up patrols of the area's hot spots. Enforcement officers are continuing their crack down on fly-tippers by regular inspections of known hot-spots and immediate investigations into all reports received from members of the public.

But fly tipping is not something the council can tackle alone, and they need the eyes and ears of everyone and appeal for them to call us if they see anything suspicious, such as vans with the back doors open on lanes or quiet roads.

Those who report suspicious incidents to the council are assured that their information is treated in the strictest confidence. To report any suspicious behaviour, call the council's customer service number on (01482) 393939.





Additional salt bins

As well as treating the precautionary and responsive road networks in the winter, East Riding of Yorkshire Council maintains salt bins for the public's use. The bins allow our residents to spread salt onto the roads and footways to reduce hazards from ice and snow.

Town and parish councils can apply for a new salt bin to help treat footpaths and roads. Any proposed locations must meet certain criteria before one can be provided. For advice on whether a salt bin would benefit your community, or to ask for an existing salt bin to be refilled, call the winter services team, on 0845 6001666.

Salting is most useful before bad weather occurs, as ice is difficult to remove once it has already formed. Try not to over-salt the surface – the salt does not need to be spread like sand. An amount about the size of a bag of sugar is more than sufficient to treat up to 50 square metres. Be careful not to spread on to grass or plants as salt can kill them.

Christmas waste

Last December and January, East Riding residents threw away 19,000 tonnes of waste, and most of it went for recycling and less to landfill. This year we hope our residents will continue to recycle, as follows :

- Blue bins : can be used for Christmas cards, plastic packaging and cardboard, stripped of sticky tape, empty large sweet tins, washed glass bottles, and washed and squashed tins and drink cartons
- Brown bins : the turkey carcass, sprout peelings and plate scrapings should be wrapped in a corn starch bag or newspaper and put in the bin for composting
- Real Christmas trees : can be put out with the brown bin and the council will take them away for composting. They can also be taken to any of the council's 10 household waste recycling sites
- Electrical goods such as TVs, fridges, small electrical items, washing machines and ovens : can be taken to the council's 10 household waste recycling sites.

The household waste recycling sites are open 10am-5pm every day except Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve when they will close at 4pm. They are closed on Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day. For locations and information about the materials they accept, visit www.eastriding.gov.uk

Use of red diesel fuel

Overwhelming parish council support for the use of red diesel fuel in vehicles gritting rural areas has led to the move being signed off by HM Revenue & Customs.

This means farmers can use tractors and other equipment on the roads for gritting while powered by coloured diesel. Previously, only vehicles constructed or adapted solely for gritting roads were allowed to use red diesel for gritting purposes.

HMRC has accepted that, due to their design and off-road capability, farming vehicles can often be the most suitable vehicles for snow clearance and gritting. It follows a firming-up of the rules after a temporary respite on red diesel last winter to help with road clearance in remote communities.

VAT legislation review

This consultation is an opportunity for parish councils and charities, including village hall management committees, to put forward their views and raise awareness of the problems that they face or have had to deal with.

Parish councils are able to reclaim VAT and halls owned and managed by them benefit from this. The majority of village halls are not registered, and are therefore unable to reclaim VAT on improvement / maintenance work.
